Reclaiming Wood (from the archives)

I love working with wood. It is a fascinating material. From wood, one can make countless different things, from functional to beautiful. The only limits are our imaginations. What's more: wood has inherent beauty. The grain patterns, colors, and other characteristics make it one of the most beautiful of all natural mediums. Why? What makes it so special? It is this: the life of the tree is displayed in the wood itself. Every event and occurrence that the tree experiences is made evident in the grain of the wood. If it was a dry year, the growth ring will be narrow and dark. If it was a wet year, the ring will be broader and lighter in color. If the tree was struck by heavy wind that hyper-flexed the tree, the rings will separate from each other at the point of flexion, then the tree will fill in those injuries with sap which will mend the damage, but will leave its mark. If the tree had a nail driven into it, or if it grew in very iron-rich soil, there will be blue or purple stains in the wood. Limb growth creates 'knots" and "burly" grain. Other things cause wavy grain, "birds-eye" grain, and other amazing and unique patterns. Damage to the tree from storms, machinery, animals, or other outside forces will certainly leave their marks. The tree will grow-over and fill in these damaged areas. It may not be noticeable from the outside, but the inside shows every event of the life of the tree.

We rescue and reclaim wood. Trees that fall in storms, lumber that has "flaws", and sawmill waste and scrap comprise much of our wood inventory. From this reclaimed material, we make useful and beautiful things Wooden spoons, trays, boxes, cutting boards, rolling pins, etc. useful, yet beautiful. The wood we start with, however, is often far from pretty to the first glance. Often, it appears to be dirty and rough-looking. Most people would identify it as firewood-worthy, and nothing more. Through experience, we have learned to see past the rough exterior and to see the potential hidden within. To release that potential, however, we must cut, carve, and shape the wood. Some parts will go for purely functional projects. Some will go for projects that we identify as "functional beauty". Other pieces are destined to become artistic in nature. To make any of these, however, results in a certain amount of wood ending up on the floor as sawdust, shavings, or scrap. Even this is useful. Sawdust and shavings are good bedding for our livestock. Scrap and other sweepings are bagged-up and burned in the furnace, producing heat and heating our domestic hot water. So, no matter what it started as, every bit of every piece of wood that goes into our shop comes out as something useful. Some are beautiful, some are functional; nothing is wasted.

I have often heard people despair that they have no idea what God could possibly make from their lives. Like trees, every event of our lives leaves a permanent mark on our hearts, creating a unique pattern and "grain". No two are exactly alike. Every choice, every experience, be it good or bad, makes a mark and affects who we are. Further, the inner beauty and usefulness of our lives is not actualized until we are broken. Just as the beauty of a tree's grain is not revealed until it is cut, so our lives are not made fully useful, nor is our true beauty revealed if we do not allow God to work in our lives. When we do allow Him to work, amazing things happen. He looks at us, just as we are, seeing past the dirt and outward ugliness. He does not relegate us to the burn-pile. Rather, He painstakingly begins to work us and reveal our potential. Parts of our lives that we thought were a waste suddenly become useful. Flaws that we felt were hideous become beautiful when shaped by the Master. Even the parts He carves away serve a purpose; they become a witness to the changing power of God. With God, NOTHING is wasted. He reclaims, and redeems every part of our lives.
